



# Jessica and Kelvin Beachum Open Second Exhibition with Selections from their Family Collection at Baylor University Narratives as Reality: Constructing an Identity will be on display May 6-Nov. 5 at Baylor's Martin Museum of Art

WACO, Texas (April 28, 2023) – Baylor University alumna Jessica Beachum, B.A. '11, and her husband, NFL offensive tackle, Kelvin Beachum, have spent the last decade building a compelling and powerful collection of artwork that explores our collective histories and their relevance throughout the journey of time. Themes of identity, the lived experience, power, and process are prevalent throughout. Their careful curation has led to a stunning collection of international artists working in various media.

<u>Narrative as Reality: Constructing an Identity</u> featuring selections from the Jessica and Kelvin Beachum Family Collection will be on display May 6 through Nov. 5 at the <u>Martin Museum of Art</u> at Baylor University. The exhibit is free and open to the public.

With an emphasis on historical relevance, artist research and scholarship, and capturing the times, the collection contributes to the art historical canon. It is their belief that art can inspire curiosity and allow people to discover history through storytelling and giving voice to their experiences.

"We want to look back on each piece and know it represents something we remember or something we never want to forget," Jessica Beachum said. "The intergenerational component is what is most special."

Kelvin and Jessica are passionate about supporting the arts, developing relationships with artists, and inspiring introspection and conversation through each piece. By sharing their collection, they provide opportunities for viewers to engage with ideas and themes that spark meaningful dialogue.

For *Narrative as Reality*, exhibition curator Dr. Valerie Gillespie, chose 21 works by 19 artists that fit into overarching themes of Black identity, lived experiences, power and process.

"Curatorial practice has always been a delicate dance between worlds where art, history, education and community collide in the most beautiful ways," Gillespie said.

The Martin Museum of Art spent the last year and a half planning for this monumental exhibition that holds great significance for Baylor University, the City of Waco, and surrounding communities. By

bringing their collection to the Martin, the Beachums have provided a unique opportunity to share their love of art with many visitors.

"This kind of exhibition allows the Baylor family, Waco and the Central Texas region to see a diverse group of artists through the scope of a curatorial approach," said Allison Chew, director of the Martin Museum. "Our job at the Martin is to share these stories, give access to our community, and create a space for compelling conversation around thoughtful themes and topics."
